Debates have been taking place among researchers and scholars about the relevance of comparative schemes and typologies of social protection systems or regimes based on Western / developed countries for the understanding of structures of social protection in developing countries, their efficiency and potential for expansion. Some projects exist that attempt to construct different frameworks based on a variety of parameters, that could offer both an academic analytical approach and a basis for policy orientations.

Along with another researcher, I have been engaged in building the foundations for a typology of social protection systems in developing countries, based on various country case studies and existing documents¹. In this presentation I will 1) discuss the perspective and methodology we use and the middle range categories we rely on, in relation with other comparative works; and 2) present the typology we ended up building, along with its heuristic value and limits.
